
Workshop in progress!

(See below) She is using Vikki Claytons hand dyed silk in black and Indigo Ocean. CH0268 Ciara Rose is worked in a variety of pinks. I also love to see the magnetic needle holder and the scissor magnet. They are such useful tools helping to keep equipment safe and visible



Changing the colours changes the dynamics of the design totally and opens up new possibilities. It is great fun to see what other people do with the designs and how they adapt and alter them to suit their requirements. I specify materials and threads that are easily available worldwide, but there are so many exciting threads and fabrics to explore and they are easily available via the Internet.

In June, July and August I will be adding something totally different to my site.

I use lettering in many of my projects, from quilting to hand embroidery and whilst there are many cross stitch alphabets available, there are very few letter fonts of a suitable size which can be used for free style, monograms or formal embroidery, so I'll be setting about designing a series of letters in different fonts which can be used for a variety of craft projects.

These are large enough to be used individually or suitable for grouping together to create something special and different. Each font pack will also include a blackwork design.

Instructions about transferring designs onto material are already on the 'Blackwork Journey' web site in the 'Techniques' section and in next month's Blog I will outline step by step how the fonts can be stitched for maximum effect using simple embroidery stitches.
